


Kneel facing east for the opening prayer

Now stand for the Gospel, facing the reader (see text in service book


After the Gospel, kneel facing east for the Commemorative Prayers


Glory and honour and power: are yours by right, O Lord our God: For you created all things: and by your will they have their being.

During the prayers of Commemoration (sung kneeling)






Concluding prayer

At the offering of the Bread


Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation. Through your goodness we have this bread to offer, which earth has given and human hands have made.

It will become our spiritual drink. Blessed be God for ever.




Let us give thanks to the Lord_ our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.





The Schola goes to receive communion (or a blessing) after the invitation.


The Communion antiphon follows after all have received Communion.

Communion antiphon (sung kneeling, facing east)




Concluding prayer and blessing (kneeling, facing east)

Silence is kept, and then the final hymn of thanksgiving is sung with the organ. Stand and face inwards – allowing space for the clergy to go through.
