Sarum Chant

THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

The Epistle

A reading from the First Epistle of Saint Paul to the Corinthians.

Brothers and sisters: Listen, I will tell you a mystery! We will not all die, but we will all be changed. In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be changed. For this perishable body must put on imperishability, and this mortal body must put on immortality. When this perishable body puts on imperishability, and this mortal body puts on immortality, then the saying that is written will be fulfilled: 'Death has been swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?' The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

The Schola sings Psalm 130 with the antiphon from the Office of the Dead

Antiphon: If thou, wilt be extreme to mark what is done amiss,

O Lord, our God, who may abide it?

Out of the deep have I called unto thee, O Lord: Lord, hear my voice.

O let thine ears consider well: the voice of my complaint. Antiphon

For there is mercy with thee: therefore shalt thou be feared.

I look for the Lord; my soul doth wait for him: in his word is my trust.

All stand for the Gospel.

There are no responses before or after the Gospel at a Commemorative Eucharist.

The Gospel

The holy Gospel according to Saint John.

Jesus said, Very truly, I tell you, the hour is coming, and is now here, when the dead will hear the voice of the Son of God, and those who hear will live. For just as the Father has life in himself, so has he granted the Son also to have life in himself; and he has given him authority to execute judgement, because he is the Son of Man. Do not be astonished at this; for the hour is coming when all who are in their graves will hear his voice and will come out – those who have done good, to the resurrection of life, and those who have done evil, to the resurrection of condemnation.

THE PRAYERS OF THE CHURCH

Kneel or sit

Glory and honour and power: are yours by right, O Lord our God: For you created all things: and by your will they have their being.

Glory and honour and power: are yours by right, O Lamb who was slain: For by your blood you have ransomed for God a kingdom of priests from every race and language from every people and nation.

The names of those to remembered are read

The Schola sings chants from the Office of the Dead

In paradisum deducant te angeli, in tuo adventu suscipiant te martyres, et perducant te in civitatem sanctam Jerusalem. Chorus angelorum te suscipiat, et cum Lazaro quondam paupere eternam habeas requiem. May the angels lead you into paradise; at your coming, may the martyrs meet you and lead you into the holy city, Jerusalem. May the choir of angels receive you, and – with the poor man, Lazarus – may you find rest.

Chants from the fourteenth-century Bangor Pontifical

This is the will of him that sent me that I should lose nothing of all that he has given me, And I will raise them up at the last day.

Hear us O merciful Father, as we remember in love those whom we have placed in your hands. Acknowledge, we pray, the sheep of our own fold, lambs of your own flock, sinners of your own redeeming. Enfold them in the arms of your mercy, in the blessed rest of everlasting peace, and in the glorious company of the saints in light. **Amen.**

Remain kneeling or sitting The Schola sings the first verse alone. All then sing the hymn from the beginning.

THE OFFERING OF THE GIFTS

All sit while the Schola sing the Offertory Antiphon

Domine, Jesu Christe, rex glorie, libera animas omnium fidelium defunctorum de manu inferni et de profundo lacu; libera eas de ore leonis, ne absorbeat eas tartarus, ne cadant in obscura tenebrarum loca; sed signifer Sanctus Michael representet eas in lucem sanctam, quam olim Abrahe promisisti et semini eius.

Lord, Jesus Christ, king of glory, free the souls of all the faithful departed from the hand of hell and from the deep pit; free them from the mouth of the lion, lest hell swallow them up, lest they fall into the void of darkness; but let your standard bearer, Saint Michael, bring them into holy light, as you promised to Abraham and his children.

When the antiphon is finished, all stand for The Thanksgiving.

At the offering of the Bread

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation. Through your goodness we have this bread to offer, which earth has given and human hands have made.

It will become for us the bread of life.


Blessed be God for ever.

Let us give thanks to the Lord_ our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

It is indeed right, it is our duty and our joy at all times and in all places to give you thanks and praise, holy Father, heavenly King, almighty, everlasting God, through Jesus Christ your only Son our Lord, who rose victorious from the dead, and comforts us with the blessed hope of everlasting life.

For your faithful people, Lord, life is changed but not taken away; and, when this mortal body is laid aside in death, an everlasting dwelling-place is made ready for us in heaven with you.

Therefore with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and saying:

Hear us, heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord. Through him accept our sacrifice of praise, and grant that, by the power of your Spirit, these gifts of bread and wine may be for us his body and his blood; who in the same night that he was betrayed took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me. In the same way after supper, he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying, Drink from this, all of you; for this is my blood of the new covenant which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it in remembrance of me.

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come in glory.

Therefore, Father, remembering the death and resurrection of your Son, we offer to you in thanksgiving this bread and this cup, your gifts for us, and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you. Send your Holy Spirit upon all of us who share this bread and this cup. Strengthen our faith, make us one and welcome us and all your people into the glorious kingdom of your Son.

Through him, with him, in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

Silence

As our Saviour taught us, we boldly pray:

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

THE COMMUNION

Jesus is the living bread which came down from heaven: if anyone eats of this bread, they will live for ever.

Lord, give us this bread always.

Give thanks to the Lord for he is gracious: his love is everlasting.



May God give to you, and all those whom you love, his comfort and peace, his light and his joy, in this world and the next; and the blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always. **Amen**.
